 essential support to a family member in their household, with previous opportunities for a break from

NNUH joins fight against coronavirus in ground-breaking new study

- The Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital has enrolled its first patients onto a ground-breaking study researching the genomes of patients who become critically ill with COVID-19.
- Researchers from the University of Edinburgh's GenOMICC project (Genetics Of Mortality In Critical Care), will work together with Genomics England and over 170 NHS hospitals including the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital. The study aims to sequence the genomes of 20,000 people who are severely ill with COVID-19. 2,000 patients have been recruited to the GenOMICC study already.
- The data collected by NNUH and others will be compared to that from a further 15,000 COVID-19
 patients who experienced only mild symptoms. This data will be collected from participants in the
 100,000 Genomes Project and UK Biobank.
- This ground-breaking research may help explain why some patients with COVID-19 experience a mild infection, others require intensive care and why for some it is sadly fatal. By discovering why some people are predisposed to developing life-threatening symptoms, the initiative will enable novel insights into the virus, as well as possible human factors that influence the effects of the disease, and whether a combination of both shape outcomes for NHS patients.

Local organisations delivering PPE to GP surgeries across Norfolk and Waveney

- Local charity Norwich Door to Door has stepped in to deliver vital PPE supplies to GP practices across Norfolk and Waveney.
- With a reduced need to travel in the current climate the charity has turned its hand to helping the community in other ways by providing volunteers and vehicles to deliver PPE to frontline staff during the coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic. They join a growing army of local volunteers and organisation who have donated their time and resources to help get supplies to those who need it.
- This delivery service is separate from and in addition to the national PPE online ordering process.
- Locally, the Norfolk Resilience Forum (NRF), made up of local public sector organisations including the NHS, has received offers of PPE from 180 companies following a successful campaign.
- In addition, CCG staff have been redeployed to support frontline services and a small team has managed to buy more than half a million items of PPE such as gloves and masks.
- Practices in Norfolk and Waveney have been asked to order from national supplies if possible but if
 they begin to run short, the CCG delivers. As well as Norwich Door to Door, there's a small army of
 CCG staff and relatives who are driving out PPE when its needed as well as other organisations
 including Norwich City Community Sports Foundation.

Local testing available for key workers, including care home staff

- **Key workers** (including NHS, care home staff, teachers and household members if eligible) can use a dedicated local arrangement or the national booking system. The local arrangement and the national system offer appointments in different places. Please see below for more details.
- **Members of the public** (who are not key workers) who are eligible according to the latest government criteria should use the national booking system.
- Find out who can be tested.

Key workers

- All key workers are invited to apply for testing, if eligible, at one of three sites in Norfolk and Waveney. Their household members may also be eligible. The sites are at:
 - James Paget University Hospital
 - The Centrum Centre near Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital
 - Queen Elizabeth Hospital, King's Lynn
- The service is by appointment only. Appointments for these locations cannot be booked using the national portal, they must be booked using our local system:
 - o **NHS acute hospital staff:** Use your organisation's existing booking arrangements.

- o All other NHS employees can email NHScovidtesting@nnuh.nhs.uk.
- All other essential workers, including care home staff: Ask your employer/line manager to
 email NorfolkRegistercovidtesting@nnuh.nhs.uk with their name, job title and contact number to
 obtain a unique code for your organisation. Once you have that, please ask for an appointment
 by email: covidtesting@nnuh.nhs.uk.
- If you choose to book via the national booking system, you will be directed to centres at Ipswich, Peterborough or Stansted, or a mobile testing centre if available.

Members of the public

Members of the public who are not key workers must book using the national booking system. You
will be offered a choice of a home testing kit or travelling to a regional testing centre. The nearest
regional testing centres are at Ipswich, Peterborough or Stansted, but from time to time mobile testing
centres will also be set up. Appointments for these will be shown on the national booking system
when available.
